IHM CONGREGATION ARCHIVIST PROJECT

During the past year S. Anitra Nemotko, IHM, Congregation Archivist of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Scranton, PA wrote a series of four reflections about the IHM community patrons. The meditations included a short biography of

each Saint's life and an appropriate quotation. The topics for the reflections included Saint Teresa of Avila, the Blessed Mother under the title of the Immaculate Conception,





Saint Joseph and Saint Alphonsus Liguori. The meditations along with images of the saints were sent via email and regular mail to all of the IHM Sisters. Mailing dates were near the calendar dates of the official

CREATING ACCESS TO RARE AND UNIQUE CATHOLIC RESEARCH MATERIALS

Founded in 2008, the Catholic Research Resources Alliance (CRRA) is a collaborative effort of Catholic college, university, seminary and diocesan archives to share their resources electronically with scholars. students and others interested in the Catholic experience. To that end, we have developed a freely available, online portal of descriptions of Catholic resources. The portal contains descriptions of resources held by its 27 member institutions. The current collecting focus is on creating access to those rare, unique and uncommon Catholic research materials relating to every aspect of the Catholic experience. Today, there are over 250,000 records in the portal to items held by member institutions. We have identified twelve primary collecting themes of particular interest and importance, including Catholic education, Catholic social action, Diocesan collections, Women's religious orders and Men's religious orders, and Vatican II. The mission of the Catholic Research Resources Alliance (CRRA) is to provide enduring global access to Catholic research resources. Our goal is to make discoverable the wealth of resources hidden in our archives and libraries. 
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SISTERS OF PROVIDENCE DIGITIZE ENTRANCE BOOK

The staff members of the Sisters of Providence Archives are making sure that all people, wherever they are located in this world, can have access to many of the Congregation's records by digitizing them.. The staff members are also trying to protect the Congregation's historical treasures from – heaven forbid – natural disasters or even a fire that could destroy or seriously damage journals, photographs, records, etc.

Thanks to the assistance of the Indiana Historical Society's Historic Document Preservation Program and the Preservation Imaging Lab, the first of two entrance books that record the entry of all women into the Congregation has been digitized. Three years ago, the journal of the foundress of the Sisters of Providence, Saint Mother Theodore Guerin, was digitized.

On Page 1 of first the entrance book is a list that includes Saint Mother Theodore Guerin as well the five as who sisters came from France with her. They are St. Sister



Vincent Ferrer Gage, Sister Basilide Seneschal, Sister Olympiade Boyer, Sister Mary Xavier Leree and Sister Mary Liguori Tiercin. On Page 2, the list of women who came after this initial group begins. It starts with Sister Louis Gonzaga's entrance on November 9, 1840. Born in Baltimore, her birth name was Marie Doyle. She was sent home February 4, 1842.

The first entrance book concludes with number 3,306 – Sister Evelyn Theresa – on page 300. Her birth name was Catherine Hickey and she was born October 3, 1918, in Chicago.

The entries not only include the woman's religious name, but, in most cases, birth name, date of birth, place of birth and parents' names. Entries include the date of the sister's death. Some indicate that the woman left voluntarily, while a few indicate that a woman was "sent" home.

SOME IDEAS IN PLANNING THE ARCHIVES OF THE FUTURE FROM THE SISTERS OF MERCY AND THE SISTERS OF ST JOSEPH

Mercy Heritage Center Receives Collections of Cincinnati Regional Community

Situated in Belmont, a quiet suburb of Charlotte, North Carolina, Mercy Heritage Center is buzzing with activity as records of Mercy communities arrive from across the Institute of the Sisters of Mercy of the Americas. Mercy Heritage Center, located near the order's South Central Community headquarters, was created in 2010 to house the records of Mercy communities in one location. Meticulous planning and renovation of a former college library yielded a state-of-the-art archival facility with more than 5,700 linear feet of compact shelving awaiting the arrival of historical records and artifacts.

Deliveries began in early 2011, with records arriving from the Institute office in Silver Spring, Maryland in February and the Pittsburgh community in April.

This fall Mercy Heritage Center continues to forge ahead toward the goal of housing the history of the Sisters of Mercy under one roof. The first delivery of the season recently

arrived from the former Cincinnati region, and included records from Fremont, as well as Cincinnati's province and community. After being carefully moved and unpacked, the collection, comprising approximately 300 linear feet, was placed in its permanent home in the climate controlled stacks of Mercy Heritage Center. Additions to this group of records will continue with the delivery of material from Nashville, Knoxville and Louisville.

"We're just thrilled," says Archivist Grant Gerlich. "To be able to house and care for these records in such a wonderful facility is a great privilege."

Mercy Heritage Center will continue to receive collections from Mercy communities across the country during the next two years and will open to researchers after the transfers are completed. Additional space has been allocated for exhibitions and programming. Be on the lookout for updates as Mercy Heritage Center continues to grow!

- 1. A succession plan a job description, what training is required.
- 2. Downsizing stamp and coin collections, undocumented relics, duplicates.
- 3. Former member files legal issues, availability to classmates, fund-raisers
- 4. What is kept in local archives and what is kept congregationally?
 - 5. When should we combine archives?

6. Looking to the future – common policies, procedures, one finding aid.

This successful meeting has set these archivists on track as they look to the future and the probable moving of archives and the necessity of establishing a common finding aid.

Judi Keehnen has been named as archivist for the newly established Congregational Archives, which is a separate archives for the government and history of the new Congregation.

OH-PENN ARCHIVISTS CELEBRATE FIFTH ANNIVERSARY

Five years ago the triennial ACWR conference at Ft. Mitchell, Kentucky spawned in part the formation of the OH-PENN Archivists, according to the historical overview report given by S. Louise Grundish, SC at the October 12, 2011 meeting of the group.

Nineteen (pictured below) of the now 25 members gathered for their semi-annual meeting at the Central Convent of the Felician Sisters in Coraopolis, Pennsylvania. S. Virginia Marie Klonowski, CSSF, led the meeting and the anniversary celebration.



The group held its first meeting in the fall of 2006 following the triennial ACWR conference at Ft. Mitchell, Kentucky. In her unscripted overview Sr. Louise Grundish, noted the interest expressed by several members to come together in the area prior to the conference. During the orientation for new members of ACWR given by Sister Mary Dennis at the Conference Sister pointed to the success of several local groups who met on a regular basis to share with one another and gain support in their activities. After returning from the conference Sr. Sandra DiNardis, CDP took the lead inviting all area archivists to an introductory meeting at Providence Villa in Gibsonia, Pennsylvania. Since then the group has met every April and October at the locations of the various archives.

The members represent 18 congregations of both women and men religious in Ohio and

Pennsylvania. As its name implies, the group is open to new members at any time. While the group has lost some members as positions changed and gained new members the meetings have been well attended throughout the five years and several members have shared expertise in particular areas. All who joined in the 5 year anniversary agreed that the time spent has been valuable and each has gained from the support of the group.

EMMA CECILIA BUSAM, OSU, RETIRES

It seems fitting that on her official retirement as the Diocesan Archivist of the Diocese of Owensboro, Kentucky the ACWR newsletter should give special attention to one of our Founders. Emma Cecilia Busam, OSU, wrote to ACWR in April, 2011 announcing her retirement.

Many who attended the last Triennial Conference in Milwaukee will remember S. Emma Cecilia who spoke to the group as the Founders for ACWR were honored. Her interest in the organization never waned and she enthusiastically attended all of the sessions ready to meet new people and learn new things.

S. Emma Cecilia entered the Ursuline Sisters at age 21 in 1942 and began a journey with God and her sisters in religion through many and varied experiences. Beginning with her first assignment to teach the first four grades at St. Joseph School in Central City, KY in 1945 until 1982 when she decided to leave teaching art and history at Catholic High School, S. Emma Cecilia taught at every level of education and used her organizational and people skills as principal for several years. After teaching adult students in the morning

and at Mount Saint Joseph Academy in the afternoon during 1982, she was asked to consider the job of archivist.

In 1983 S. Emma Cecilia accepted the position of archivist and museum curator for Mount Saint Joseph and began to learn and build her new career. She became a member of the Society of American Archivists in 1983, became a certified archivist, and in 1994 the Society honored her with the Sister M. Claude Lane Award for her significant contribution in the field of religious archives. In 1990 she became a founding member of the Archivist for Congregations of Women Religious.

In 1991 S. Emma Cecilia began serving as the Diocesan Archivist for the Diocese of Owensboro. She wrote:

"Since 1991 I have been working as our Diocesan Archivist for a stipend in order to bring the holding of the Diocese of Owensboro up-to-date. It has been a labor of love because I do enjoy the work even as a volunteer. However, I officially retired as archivist on February 16th of this year.

At the age of 75 all Bishops must submit a resignation to Our Holy Father, however, they may continue on, year by year, if health permits. Our former Bishop John J. McRaith wanted me to 'stay as long as he was bishop.' He received an early retirement because of his health. Reverend J. Michael Clark, who became the Administrator until a new Bishop could be appointed, indicated he would like for me to stay until a new Bishop was Reverend William Francis appointed. Medley became our new Bishop on February 10, 2010 and said he didn't want to change anything for a year. Because of my age I feel it only right that someone

younger pick up where I left off. The Diocesan archives will be in good hands. It was truly a grateful surprise to have the archives named for me."

Congratulations to S. Emma Cecilia Busam. Your life and work stand as an inspiration to all. May you continue to have opportunities to enjoy your art, woodworking, and a good card game. Thanks for all your contributions to the Archival Profession and especially to the Archivists of Congregations of Women Religious.
